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Georges Florovsky – Paul L. Gavrilyuk

Sergius (Stragorodskii, 1867-1944), Russian hierarch and theologian, in 1943-1944 appointed Patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church. Florovsky is referring to his opposition to Sergius’s so-called Declaration of 1927 which announced the Church’s unconditional loyalty to the Soviet authorities.

Born in Odessa in 1893, Father Georges Florovsky was Assistant Professor at the University of Odessa in 1919. Having left Russia, Fr. Florovsky taught philosophy in Prague from 1922 until 1926. He was then invited to the chair of Patrology at St. Sergius' Orthodox Theological Institute in Paris. In 1948 Fr. Florovsky came to the United States. He

BIBLE, CHURCH, TRADITION: AN EASTERN ORTHODOX VIEW

Florovsky juxtaposed “ecumenism in space”, concerned with the establishment of the universal Christian unity with “ecumenism in time” which he saw as striving towards a recovery of a common faith which once united all Christians. Florovsky quickly emerged as the most authoritative living voice of Russian Orthodoxy in the West, and he sought to use his position to pose new questions about ecumenicity derived from his reflection on the Russian experience and its Byzantine past.
